Monica Boyles (Angry Woman in the Audience) makes her first stage appearance in *Our Town* since the age of five! She enjoys the play's down to earth and old fashioned values. Sharon Buchanan (Concerned Woman in the Audience, Costumes) has previously done costuming for the Take II Drama Club and shows with Second Street Players' Children's Theatre and Possum Juniors. She has also been onstage in various Second Street Children's Theatre shows. "Fairy Tales and musicals are my favorite," she says. Sharon lives in Georgetown with her daughter, Allie, and combines work schedules at Harrison Senior Living and Nanticoke Memorial Hospital where she is a supervisor, staff nurse, and forensic nurse examiner. "Thorton Wilder's economy of language and simplicity of staging has enhanced the timeless subject matter of everyday life," Doug says. "Every audience member can relate to pivotal life events that are presented in a gentle and honest manner." Mike Geisweidt (Sam Craig) has been seen on the Riverfront stage in *The Miracle Worker*, *Arcadia* and *Taking Steps*. "Thorton Wilder's unique style of interchanging the past with the present portrays the struggles of life and death for the residents of Grover's Corners," Mike says. "Wilder nudges the audience to embrace the moment, truly appreciate the 'here and now,' and accept the notion of change." Mike lives in Felton where he spoils his yellow lab, Daisey. 

"I have loved this play since I played Mrs. Gibbs at Caesar Rodney High School. Our Town shares with its audience a sense of life we all know but might not understand or even know that we know it." Titia lives in Prime Hook (with her mom and dad, and doggie, Dixie) where she says "our small but very close knit community has seen the very same things shown to us from Wilder's Our Town." Titia is an RN at Hope House Group Home.



Carly Jo Hosbach (Emily) returns to the Riverfront stage after appearing in 2010's Meshuggah-Nuns!. She also was in the booth as production assistant for Cat on a Hot Tin Roof. A resident of Milford via Pittsburgh, Carly Jo has appeared onstage in The Marriage of Figaro, The Sound of Music, and Footloose. Carly Jo graduated from Ohio University and earned a Masters Degree from Misericordia University. She is a speech-language pathologist in inpatient rehabilitation. "Anyone can find their own meaningful relationship to Our Town," Carly Jo says, "whether it's love, family, or taking the time to realize the little things in life."



Malcolm Keen (Constable) has appeared in Second Street's *The Miracle Worker* and *Babes In Toyland*, the Clear Space production of *Our Town*, and many other shows. He says, "In *Our Town*, you are reminded of the emotional roller coaster that is life and the need to 'stop and smell the roses' every now and then." Malcolm recalls that his hometown, just like Grover's Corners, "had a night watchman before we had a police department, a soda fountain, a town drunk, high school romances, gardens, and church choirs." Malcolm lives in Lewes and is the membership coordinator with the Rehoboth Beach Film Society.



George Liosi (Joe Stoddard) has been involved in community theatre most of his adult life, appearing in such productions as Fiddler on the Roof, Oliver, and 1776. George taught in the Hackensack public schools and says that "introducing young people to the theatre was one of the most satisfying aspects of my 35 year career." He recalls that growing up in New York City's Hell's Kitchen was not like Grover's Corners, but that "everyone on the block looked out for each other." 45 years ago, George and his bride, Peggy, lived in the converted carriage house at Milford's Sunnybrae Estate before moving to NJ. In 2008, they retired to Bridgeville.



Ben Lonski (Howie Newsome) has appeared in SSP's To Kill a Mockingbird, Dinner With Friends, Oscar & Felix, The Homecoming, and Meshuggah-Nuns!. A member of SSP's Board, Ben most recently directed Cat on a Hot Tin Roof and will direct this fall's I Love You, You're Perfect, Now Change. "The old theatre adage is to never share a scene with children or animals," Ben says. "I know that's true because I could never get Bessie to mind me onstage!" Ben is a physical therapy assistant at the Milford Center. He lives in Magnolia with his wife, Debbie, and enjoys time with their children, Troy, Rebecca, Sarah, and Patrick.



**Devon Lynch** (Joe & Sy Crowell) is back at Riverfront after portraying the Cat in the Hat in last year's *Seussical—The Musical*. He has also appeared in Possum Point Players' productions of *Around the World in 80 Days*, *A Christmas Carol*, and *James and the Giant Peach*. "Now, I've had a great time working with a great cast and bringing Grover's Corners to life," he says. Devon is a sixth grader at the Southern Delaware School of the Arts. He lives in Georgetown with his parents, Brad and Deanna, and siblings, Peyton and Logan. When he's away from the theatre, Devon enjoys singing, playing Wii, and going to the movies.



**Don Megee** (Doc Gibbs) returns to the Riverfront stage after last appearing in 2008's *Spitfire Grill*. He is a frequent performer with Possum Point Players having been seen in *Little Shop of Horrors*, *A Christmas Carol*, *Guys and Dolls*, *The Rainmaker*, *Urinetown*, and many others. He also appeared in *Bell*, *Book and Candle* at the Milton Theatre. Don teaches at Sussex Central Senior High School and lives in Georgetown with his wife, Tara. Don recalls, "When I was younger, Georgetown was much like Grover's Corner because it seemed that everyone knew each other and were concerned for each other."



Charlie Meyer (Simon Stimson) has been active in community theatre since making his stage debut at the age of three. He froze and was carried offstage in tears but a career on the boards was born! He has appeared in and directed numerous productions in Baltimore, North Carolina, and Delaware. Locally, Charlie directed The Drunkard and has appeared in Nuncrackers, Bell, Book and Candle and You Can't Take It With You. He is also active with Possum Point's Ad Hoc Touring Company. Charlie and his wife, Sue, reside in Lewes where they provide vacation housing for their six children and seven grandchildren.



Susan Newark (Mrs. Soames, Producer, Props) has appeared in several Second Street shows including Seussical—The Musical, Cinderella, Annie, The Sound of Music, and The Miracle Worker. 

Steve Twilley (Editor Webb) returns to the Riverfront stage after recently appearing in Second Street's *Cat on a Hot Tin Roof*. #### From the director...

In 1982, I played George in a community theatre production of *Our Town*. Since that time, one of Emily's lines has stayed with me... "Do human beings ever realize life while they live it — every, every minute?"

Our *Town* reminds us to look at the aspects of our life. It is not about nostalgia, the goodness of life at the turn of the 20<sup>th</sup> century or what we have gained and lost in society since then. It's about you and me sitting here in the seats of this theatre today, right now. The inhabitants of Grover's Corners are struggling with the same challenges that we are struggling with: daily life, love, marriage and death. It's about what we spend most of our daily lives worrying over and how that's keeping us from recognizing the wonder, the joy, the magnificence, the eternal.



At the end of the day, do we truly appreciate all that we have? Many of us say we couldn't live without Facebook or our iPhone, or a lot of money, or how our career makes us someone or bragging rights for the notable things we do in our free time. So much in our culture begs us to forget, to rise up and be successful, to move fast and keep up. When we go through our lives this way, how much are we going to pass by without noticing? How much richer would our lives be if we took the time to find delight in where we are, in who we are with and in what we have?

Realize life....every, every minute. I hope that this sentiment stays with you when you leave the theatre as it has stayed with me all of these years.
